This year’s annual meeting in San Antonio, Texas, will celebrate the grit and determination of our ancestors who left Virginia where our immigrant ancestor Jean Pierre Bondurant settled in 1700, moving westward to make a new life in those territories as they were made available for settlement. (See BFA newsletter 106 for details about the program.)

As we all know, with this westward migration, the spelling of our family name changed, too: from *Bondurand* or *Bondurant* to *Bundrant*, *Bundrum*, *Bundren*, *BonDurant*, and many other variations. The BFA DNA project has shown that we’re all cousins.

As a part of this year’s program on Saturday, Oct. 17, our host Michael Felts-Salzburg has prepared a presentation on the part of the *Bundrant* family that remained in Tennessee, when many of their siblings came to settle near Sugar Loaf, Texas.

The mother of this family, Lucy Gilley Bundrant, filed a petition for a pension of \$8.00 per month as the widow of War of 1812 soldier John Bundrant, who died in 1850. Over 50 pages of correspondence, affidavits and depositions can be found in her War of 1812 file on Fold3. Lucy traveled from Tennessee to Texas and back several times before she died in Texas Sept. 9, 1882 and was buried in the Shiloh Baptist Church cemetery on the property of her son, Rev. Harden Alexander Bundrant. This land was taken in 1942 by the establishment of Camp Hood (now Fort Hood) and the graves were moved to the Killeen City Cemetery.

BFA member Susan Bundrant Scharf gave a presentation at last year’s annual meeting about the Texas branch of this family, with numerous photos shared with her by other descendants on the *Bundrant Family Surname* Facebook page.¹

The **Annual Business Meeting and Program** on Saturday, Oct. 17th, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., is being hosted by Michael and Kevin Salzburg-Felts at their home (1810 Flowerdale Street, San Antonio). A catered lunch will be provided - **pre-payment of \$8 per person** or eat on your own. A shuttle from the Hilton Garden Inn will be provided for guests.

LODGING – The Hilton Garden Inn San Antonio Airport is this year’s host hotel. BFA block of rooms (block code “BONFAM”) are \$99 per night, plus tax, for two queen beds or one king. This price includes complimentary full breakfast buffet for all guest rooms (up to four people per room), complimentary Wi-Fi, and free parking. A limited number of handicap/ADA accessible rooms are also available (first come, first served).

The hotel offers a free shuttle to and from the San Antonio Airport, and to other locations within a five-mile radius of the hotel to its guests.

MEALS – A **catered lunch on Saturday as a part of the annual meeting** will be hosted by Michael and Kevin Salzburg-Felts - \$8 per person – **pre-payment by Tuesday, Sept. 15, is required** (see the annual meeting registration form to sign up). Or you may come to the morning meeting and leave to eat lunch on your own elsewhere.

BUNDRANT FAMILY PLACES OF INTEREST – KILLEEN AREA

SUGAR LOAF, TEXAS. Sugar Loaf was twelve miles northeast of Copperas Cove in southeastern Coryell County. It was settled in 1852 and named for its proximity to Sugar Loaf Mountain. A post office was established there in 1874, but Sugar Loaf faded after being bypassed by the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe line in 1882. In the 1890s the community had a general store, a gristmill and gin, and a population of thirty. When the post office was discontinued in 1899, mail for the community was sent to Brookhaven in Bell County. Residents of Sugar Loaf were forced to move when the Fort Hood military reservation was established in the early 1940s.²

Sugar Loaf – In Coryell County, about seven miles north of where Killeen would be established. The site of the area's last Indian massacre in 1859. Named for Sugar Loaf Mountain (971 ft.), a “bald, volcano-shaped mini-mountain because pioneers thought it resembled a well-known candy of the day called Sugar Loaf.” Sometimes called the “cradle of Killeen” because several of Killeen's early citizens originated in Sugar Loaf, including Killeen's first doctor, W.W. McCorcle, and first undertaker, Richard Moses Cole. By the 1930s, only a cemetery and a church remained. Students went to school at Palo Alto or Brookhaven. When Fort Hood was built in 1942, it engulfed Sugar Loaf. The cemetery was moved to and joined with Killeen's cemetery. Among the tombstones was that of Sarah Scroggins, who was 103 years old at the time of her death in 1882. Her epitaph reads: “Gone to meet her 18 children and three husbands.”³

Palo Alto – Pronounced “Pally Alto.” Post office established Nov. 8, 1872, east of what became Killeen (and, as of 2013, inside the city limits). By the 1930s, it was north of Killeen, with some of its farms/ranches located in Coryell County. A 1930s map shows it a couple of miles south of Sugar Loaf. In 1882, Palo Alto's post office was transferred to Killeen, which had already been named. Before Killeen's establishment, there was also a store, a school, and a church in Palo Alto. By the 1930s, there was just the schoolhouse. Killeen likely would have been named Palo Alto (because the post office had already been named), but the new town was established on railroad-owned property and the railroad insisted on the name change. Palo Alto disappeared in the 1940s when Camp Hood was constructed and acquired the land.

Brookhaven – In Bell County, northeast of Killeen; east of Palo Alto; north of Hay Branch. Before 1882, the area was known as Post Oak Branch, site of revivals and camp meetings. It was named

Brookhaven when a Post Office was installed. Brookhaven may have been chosen since two of the area's residents (Charlie and Ed Oswalt) were from Brookhaven, Mississippi. Had a population of 30 during the 1930s, several businesses, a school and a church. In 1913, the post office was discontinued. There was a syrup mill from 1930 to 1942. The area is now part of Fort Hood. Some of Brookhaven disappeared in 1942 with Camp Hood's first land acquisition, while the eastern parts remained until 1953 when Fort Hood expanded again. Most of the Brookhaven area is now under Belton Lake, and the rest is on the eastern edge of Fort Hood.



The family of Rev. Harden Alexander Bundrant of Sugar Loaf, Coryell County, Texas

Harden Alexander Bundrant, son of Lucy Gilley and John Bundrant, was born 2 Mar 1833 in Warren Co., TN, and died 4 Feb 1907 in Coryell Co., TX. He married Nancy Jane Hancock 2 Mar 1856 in McLennan Co., TX. She was born 8 Jun 1840 in Covich Co., MS, died 7 Mar 1890 in TX, daughter of William Hancock and his wife Mary Roberts Hancock.

He was a Missionary Baptist minister and built Shiloh Church on his property near Sugar Loaf, TX. When Camp Hood was established in 1942, the graves in the church cemetery



were moved to the Killeen City Cemetery. There are 24 Bundrant graves listed on www.findagrave.com website for the Killeen City Cemetery. Photos of some of the original grave markers from the Shiloh Cemetery also have been posted.

James Bondurant, b. in Kentucky, d. before 1900 in Paducah, McCracken Co., KY. He married 1st ca. 1880 to unknown woman who died after 1884 in McCracken Co., KY. They had 2 known children (from 1900 census):

1. George C. Bondurant - b. 14 May 1881 in Paducah, McCracken Co., KY, d. 11 Mar. 1923 in McCracken Co., KY. [1900 census gives birth as May 1880 in KY; Death Certificate (DC) by 2nd wife Bessie gives birthday as 14 May 1881 & born in Paducah (parentage is left blank of DC). KY Death Index lists it as ca. 1880.] He married 1st. before 1905 to **Elizabeth P. SANDER** (her tombstone lists it as Sanders), dau. of Bernard Sander (sometimes given as Sanders, tombstone Sander; b. June 1837 in Germany, d. 21 Feb. 1887 in McCracken Co., KY, and wife Johanna Conerous (also given on Elizabeth's death certificate as Johnna Coneress; b. 18 Jan. 1850 in Germany, d. 17 Apr. 1928 in McCracken Co., KY, both buried at Mt. Carmel in Paducah, Johanna is on same stone with son John Bernard Sander). Elizabeth's stone is engraved with her name as Elizabeth P. Sanders, wife of Geo. Bondurant, buried in Mt. Carmel, tombstone lists her birth as 21 Jan. 1877, d. 26 Feb. 1912 in McCracken Co., KY. Per KY Birth Record her birth date is listed as 21 Jan. 1876 in McCracken Co., KY; 1900 Census lists it as Jan. 1877; and KY Death Index as ca. 1878 with Death Certificate as 21 Jan. 1878. According to Elizabeth's DC her informant is G.C. Bondurant of Paducah. According to George's DC he was also buried at Mt. Carmel (no stone listed on Find-A-Grave). They had one known child: Louis Bernard Bondurant.

Find-A-Grave has her as Ida May Wallace, b. 4 Apr 1894, d. 1 Apr 1987 in McCracken Co., bur. in Maplelawn Cem. in Paducah. She married Dell Allen Wallace (son of BJ & wife Mattie A Wallace, both buried at Newton Creek Bapt. Ch. Cem.), b. 8 Jan 1892 in Ballard Co., KY, d. 19 Jul 1967 in Paducah, bur. in Maplelawn with 2nd wife Viola C. b. 13 Apr 1909 d. 26 Dec 1979 -they are married on 1940 census in Paducah) whom she was divorced from according to 1940 census in Paducah. Maplelawn where mother along with father and his 2nd wife are also buried). Jack is serving in US Army, found him with wife Catherine H./Katherine (age 21, b. TN) and son Edward (age 0) on 1945 Orange Co., FL census (Orlando). Jack and Catherine both have stones with only birth day inscribed on them at Maplelawn.
4. Joseph T. "Joe" Bondurant, b. 5 Oct. 1898 in Ballard Co., KY, d. 2 Feb. 1981 in Akron, Summit Co., OH. (1920 census lists him as Joseph C. Bondurant, living with his step-mother Katie Evetts Bondurant Ragland in Ballard Co., KY; 1930 Census lists him as Joseph S.; 1910 gives his first name simply as Jas. (possibly should be Jos.) He married ca. 1921 in KY to Mary Llewellyn Crice, b. 26 Sep. 1901 Ballard Co., KY, d. 26 Mar. 2002 in Tallmadge, Summit Co., OH, bur. In Greenlawn Mem'l Cem., Summit Co., OH. She was dau. of son Crice and dau. Bridgewater (1910 census finds her with her grandmother Mary Ann Tankersley Bridgewater in Ballard Co., KY. They had 2 children:
- A. Wanda M. (b. 20 Feb. 1922, d. 18 Jul 1923 in Ballard Co., KY)
 - B. James A. Bondurant - b. 5 Nov. 1934 in Akron OH, was still living in 2002 in Akron; m. Joann Callihan (dau. of Walter R. & Kathleen Callihan (both b. in WV & d. in OH), b. 13 Feb. 1937 in OH); they have 6 known children: Kathleen Jo "Kathy", Vickie Lee, James Richard, Joseph T., Deborah L., and Scott, all born in Akron OH.

Katie remarried ca. 1903 (1910 census lists them as married 7 yrs., she is mother of 4 children with 2 living - i.e. 2 Bondurant and 2 Ragland with both Ragland children deceased as both Bondurant children are with them on census) to **Edmund** (also listed as Edmond and Edward) **T. Ragland**, son of Edmund Turner Ragland & Mary P. Gaines, b. 8 Dec. 1857 in KY, d. 13 Nov. 1926 in Bandana, Ballard Co., KY, bur. In Newton Creek Bapt. Ch. Cem., Ragland, McCracken Co., KY. They had two known children:
