## **B.F.A. MEETING Oct. 23- 24, 1992, Franklin, TN**

**Friday night, Oct. 23rd**, members gathered to register, have "show and tell" and learn the program for the Saturday meeting. A large wall banner with a red field and black lettering contained the coat of arms of the town of Genolhac, France, and the name of the Bondurant Family Association. This family tribute was the work of Ginny Wray and added a striking note to the meeting room.

**Saturday morning, Oct. 24th**, the annual meeting of the Bondurant Family Association was opened by president Carroll Wray, with 26 present. He led the group in the Lord's Prayer after which all members stood, introduced themselves and gave their antecedents.

David Bondurant presented a slide show about his February 1992 trip to Genolhac, France.

## **BUSINESS MEETING**

Minutes of the 1991 Bondurant Family Association meeting were read; there were no additions or corrections. The Treasurer's report was a balance of \$1,236.91 on hand. [12/1 - \$1,586.91]

## **Old Business**

Discussion of graveyard maintenance of the Bondurant cemetery near Midlothian, VA. Mrs. Anne Travis of Mosley, VA, will be contacted to oversee the maintenance. Mary Warren made a motion that \$250 be set aside from the treasury for the cemetery's maintenance for one year. The motion was seconded and carried.

It was announced that Harry Greene and John Tyree Bondurant will continue to develop by-laws for the BFA. These will be ready for approval by the membership at the next meeting in October 1993.

After a discussion, a motion was made, seconded and carried that all members of the BFA might voluntarily send their genealogical information to L.D.S. FAMILY HISTORY LIBRARY,

35 North West Temple, Salt Lake City, UT 84150. If there are any questions contact Carroll Wray.

### **New Business**

After a discussion, a motion was made, seconded and carried that a group of BFA members go to Genolhac, France where a suitably inscribed marker will be placed on the Bondurant family home.

Mary Beth Lozo and Mary Warren will take care of the wording of the plaque, and Carroll Wray will be in charge of producing the plaque. A motion was made, seconded, and carried that a cap of \$1,000 be placed on the project. The plaque will be unveiled on Saturday, August 21st, 1993 at Genolhac during their festival of "The roads to toleration."

A motion was made that the next BFA meeting be in Richmond, VA. Discussion ensued and the motion was seconded and carried. Tentative dates are Oct. 22, 23rd, 1993.

After an initial discussion, a motion was made, seconded, and passed, that the Bondurant genealogy be published in book form. The committee named were Mary Beth Lozo and Mary Warren.

### **Election of Officers**

David Bondurant of Colorado was nominated and unanimously elected to serve as Treasurer. Dues will remain at \$5 a year. Previous officers will continue in their offices for one more year: Co-presidents Carroll and Ginny Wray  
Secretary Gretchen Bondurant.

Mary Beth Lozo and Mary Warren were presented with plaques in appreciation of their work for the Bondurant Family Association. The business meeting was adjourned.

Mary Thomas Dennis gave a talk on Benjamin Bondurant and his descendants of KY and TN. She also reported on the upkeep of the Benjamin Bondurant cemetery near Fulton, KY, the cost and problems.

Mary Warren showed her slides of a visit to Genolhac and nearby Bondurant sites during last July. She reported that many of the original records pertaining to our families remain scattered in the "city hall" of little towns, and have not been microfilmed by the Mormons. It was her suggestion that some European research funds be raised, and copies of these documents obtained while they survive.

Additional photographs of Genolhac had been taken by Terry Bondurant while she was studying in France during the summer.

After the program, members gathered for a buffet lunch.

## **WE'VE BEEN INVITED TO ERECT A PLAQUE IN FRANCE HONORING OUR BONDURANT ANCESTORS**

In letters to our co-Presidents, and to the editor, Monsieur Jean-Pierre Olivier, Mayor of Genolhac, Gard, France, asked our association to participate in their annual festival August 21, 1993. The town council also approved the erection of a commemorative plaque by the Bondurant Family Association. Mary Warren took them issues of the BFA newsletter when she went to Genolhac last July.

Monsieur Olivier sent details of their "fete" [in French], which will focus on the long struggle of the Huguenots to gain recognition and toleration after the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes in 1685. A pageant written by well-known film producer Jean-Pierre Chabrol, a native of Genolhac, with music by Francis Lemarque, will be performed that weekend. Sunday noon a village-wide luncheon will be held, closing the festivities.

**OUR FRENCH ANCESTORS**

1. ANTOINE BONDURANT of Genolhac, hotel owner. His son was
2. JEAN BONDURANT, d. ca. 1570, m. **Gabrielle Brunet**, dau. of Antoine Brunet and MAURICETTE BONDURANT
3. ANTOINE BONDURANT m. 2-2-1558 **Gilette Amat**.
4. JEAN BONDURANT d. ca. 1654, physician and hotelkeeper at Genolhac. Lived in 42 LE GRAND RUE house. **He was said to be of a family of MALILHÈRES [don't know where this is or was]**. Jean m. 10-4-1602 Mrs. **Suzanne Quarante** Lyris, dau. of Anthonie Quarante II, whose family had owned this house for several generations. Her 1st husband was Raymond Leyris, a merchant, by whom she had a dau. Françoise Leyris who m. M. Hérail.  
Jean and Suzanne were married in a Huguenot wedding. She received the house from her father in 1602, and died testate in 1642. It was bequeathed to her oldest son (below).
5. PIERRE de BONDURANT, doctor of law and "avocat", d. 2-11-1688, inherited the home at 42 le Grand Rue. He m. 1st **Françoise de Joyeuse** (ours); m. 2nd Françoise de Guion. Both he and his 2nd wife Françoise abjured the Huguenot faith, and became "newly converted" Catholics. **[See him on tax list.]**
6. JEAN PIERRE BONDURANT, Sieur de Cougoussat, b. 1636, d. 5-24-1694, m. 10-28-1676 in the Huguenot Church at Barre des Cevennes, Lozere, of which her brother was the pastor, to **Gabrielle de Barjon**, b. 1-18-1643 at St. Etienne Valle Française, Lozere. Gabrielle also abjured her Huguenot faith, and died as a "newly converted" Catholic. She d. 3-23-1695 at Genolhac.
7. JEAN PIERRE BONDURANT, b. 7-18-1677 and baptised in the Huguenot church at Genolhac; rebaptized in the Catholic Church at Genolhac following the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes in 1685. As a young man he became "a fugitive from the Kingdom" when he fled to Switzerland, where he joined his uncle Pastor Guillaume Barjon at Aarau, Switzerland. Jean Pierre left for England and Virginia, while Barjon and his congregation were resettled in Helmershausen, near Kassel, Germany. Jean Pierre died on his plantation south of the James River, on Jones Creek, now Powhatan Co., VA, in early 1734.

GABRIELLE de BARJON was the dau. of Huguenot Pastor PIERRE de BARJON, b. 1662, d. 1685 at St. Marcel de Fontfouillouse, and of JEANNE de BELCASTEL. "Castanet" comes into the family through the Belcastels.

GENOLHAC - today there are 9 Bondurant families living in or near the village, descendants of our Jean Pierre's numerous cousins. The 1650's Genolhac tax digest shows a number of Bondurants in various occupations.

COUGOUSSAT - M. Olivier has located this property belonging to Jean Pierre's father; it is about 3 miles from the present town of Genolhac. We assume it was a farm or community over which he had control.

GRAVES? - Following the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes, and the Camisard War with Huguenots, churches (called Temples) and graveyards of Huguenots were to be "pulled down." The Huguenot cemetery at Genolhac was destroyed, according to mayor Olivier. Only the old Huguenot Temple at nearby Vilas survived from this period.

POSSIBILITY: If earlier generations were NOT Huguenot, and those who were "newly converted" [N.C. in the church register] died as Catholics, there MAY be extant tombs or tombstones. Since this is a rocky area, many graves are above ground, like the above-ground vaults at Concoules.

LAND - We need to obtain copies and translations of tax returns of our ancestors; the tax book contains details of all real estate and taxable personal property. This can be done by visiting the smaller towns, or by getting photocopies from the larger ones.

TOWN AND CHURCH RECORDS have not been microfilmed by LDS unless they were transferred to the "state" archives -- which most have not. To get records we need from the small towns where most of our family lived, we must go there or have a researcher visit the Mairie (the town hall) and make copies.

**We've obtained permission to erect this marker,

In the past we've raised funds to fence a graveyard [Project 1], and erect a marker [Project 2]. Project 3 was earmarked to support American research, and Project 4 for European research.

Now we have the challenge to finance the erection of this commemorative marker at Genolhac. Carroll Wray estimates the cost will be about \$1,000. He will oversee the design of the plaque, and its fabrication. The plaque will then be shipped to Monsieur Olivier in Genolhac who will have it mounted (at our expense) ready for the unveiling in August.

## A TRIP TO GENOLHAC PLANNED FOR THE UNVEILING

Discussed with great interest at our meeting was the possibility of going to Genolhac to be part of the "fete" in August 1993. An estimated cost for a 7 day trip (including the flights from a common "hub" in the US is \$2,500 - \$3,000 per person. Our itinerary might include:

August 17 (Tuesday)- Overnight flight from US, arriving in Paris in time for breakfast. Ride through the city, lunch, board the TGV train for a fast trip to Avignon, Medieval seat of the Popes. Spend the night.

August 18 (Wednesday) - After breakfast take a tour of the city. Lunch, then drive to Alès; spend four nights here.

August 19 (Thursday) - After breakfast visit Mialet's Huguenot museum, then to St. Etienne, Barre de Cevennes, and Florac where our ancestors lived. Return to Alès for the night.

August 20 (Friday)- After breakfast visit Portes, and Chateau Castanet. Back to Genolhac for the opening Fete. Return to Alès for the night.

August 21 (Saturday) - Participate in the Genolhac celebration, and be present for the afternoon unveiling of the plaque. Return to Alès for the night.

August 22 (Sunday) - Pack bags, return to Genolhac for the village dinner. Take the late afternoon train from Avignon to Paris; spend the night.

August 23 (Monday) - Return flight to US.

## FAMILY CLUES

From THE FARRARS, by Alvahn Holmes, p. 156

Will of Mrs. Sarah Brown Woodson, signed 24 Feb. 1702, proved 1 Nov. 1704 Henrico Co., VA. was witnessed by J Bonderant (sic) [our Jean Pierre].

Thanks to Ms. Wanda L. Burcham: DIARY OF JOHN EARLY, METHODIST BISHOP. The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, vol. 34, p. 247, 1924.

Sat. 24 [July 1812] I went to Agee's, 7 miles. I tried to preach but had to keep my coat on I was so cold with chills but the Lord blessed me and I [was] well in mind and praised my King. That night I went to Bondurants a M[ethodist] preacher, 6 miles.

Sunday 25th [July] to Bransford's, 2 miles. I tried to preach on Hebrews 11:1. Some cried, others shouted and jumped for joy.

O my God, help sinners come to experience.

O, my dear King, make more Methodists in this neighborhood that the devil's kingdom may fall entirely. Amen.

Tuesday, Oct. 3. Lynchburg the Lord was among the dear black people.

### COMMENTS:

James Agee, son of Mathiew Agee and Ann Godwin, daughter of Isaac Godwin and Ann, b. 1725, married 1746 Mary Elizabeth Fre/Ford, daughter of James Fore/Ford and Ann Bondurant, daughter of Jean Pierre Bondurant and Ann. James Agee lived near Maysville, Buckingham Co., VA. After 75 years of wedded life both James and Mary Elizabeth died in 1821. "their home was a meeting place for the neighborhood, and religious services were conducted there from time to time. Bishop Francis Asbury, the first Methodist bishop sent from England conducted meetings there.

Rev. Thomas Bondurant, son of John Bondurant and Sarah Taylor, married Rhoda Agee, daughter of James Agee and Mary E. Fore. Their home was also in Buckingham Co.

James Bransford m. Celia Agee, b. 1765, daughter of James Agee and Marie E. Ford.

From Mrs. Martha Williams of Dallas, TX

"Found this George Bondurant is in the list of Green Co., KY land grants. I have seldom run across the name in earlier dates outside of VA. GEORGE BONDURANT, 200 acres on Greasy Creek, page 191.

From a letter received by John Parnell Bondurant in 1933 from George Perkins Bondurant, P.O. Box 2512, Birmingham, AL:

I have a great deal of Bondurant history, and shall be glad to give you all of the Bondurant history you wish, that I have. The Jean Pierre Bondurant you speak of, and the other Bondurants whom I will soon tell you about, arrived in Virginia about 1700, landing as you say in Mannikin Town [sic], about five miles above the James River. They were supposed to be French Huguenots.

I was born on the James River in Nelson County, VA. My father was named Alexander Joseph Bondurant, and his father was born in Buckingham Co., VA, his name was Thomas Moseley Bondurant. My grandfather, Thomas Moseley Bondurant, was born in 1799.

EDITOR'S NOTE: It was Thomas Moseley Bondurant's homesite and graveyard the BFA group visited during our meeting at Farmville, VA, three years ago.

Upper Cane Creek Congregational Methodist Church Cemetery:

Samantha Bondurant, born 4 Aug. 1882, died 15 June 1978

America-Bondurant born 26 Feb. 1840, died 5 Jan. 1927

I.H. Bondurant born 9 May 1836, died 12 May 1920.

From CITY GEMETERY OF JACKSONVILLE, ALABAMA, p. 61

Charles Edwin Bondurant, born 15 Sept. 1859, died 7 April 1952.

Census records of 1900 (p. 17b) and 1910 (p. 13A) contained information that he was b. AL, in the grocery business. He m. 1881 to Sallie or Sadie L., and had 3 children: Louise R., Lillie D., and John Charles.

Charles E. Bondurant may have been son of J.F. and R.L. Bondurant found in Perry Co., p. 623, 1860, p. 333, 1870 census.

The obituary of Sadie Bondurant, TAS 14 May 1916, p. 5, said she died at Talladega. On 6 Dec. 1917, marriage book J, p. 165, Charles E. Bondurant m. Dovie Sayers.

John Charles Bondurant married Ruth Abercrombie 8 Dec. 1916, Marriage Boom, I, p. 418. the obituary for C.E. Bondurant (TAS 8 April 1952, p. 1, stated that he lived at 405 S Pelham, was a Presbyterian, a Mason (held every office in the Masonic Lodge), and was survived by two daughters, Mrs. E.J. Ward and Mrs. B.B. Warwick, and a son, John Charles, the widow, 4 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

From Carol D. Veal, 82 Bloomingdale Rd., Quaker Hill, CT 06375, seeks information on Bondurants of Greene, Hale and Perry Cos., AL ca. 1830-70. These Bondurants were intertwined with the Williams and Burford families. Quite a tangle.

(1) My grandfather's sister, Cornelia M. Williams, was born in AL in 1848, m. a Mr. Bondurant. No further information on either.

(2) Cornelia's sister Mary Jane Williams born 4 April 1840, was the 2nd wife of William D. Burford. His first wife was a Miss Bondurant, probably Nancy H. Bondurant, daughter of Thomas Bondurant and Mary. I have the 1850 Perry Co., AL census record for Thomas and family, also have copied the tombstones of the Bondurants in the cemetery at Uniontown.

(3) Cornelia Burford, daughter of Mary Jane Williams and William D. Burford, above, married William Bondurant, who was the nephew of Miss Bondurant (most probably Nancy H.), first wife of William D. Burford. When William Bondurant's first wife died, he married her sister Maggie Burford.

We have gathered a lot of records on the Williams family including siblings of Cornelia and Mary Jane, descendants, parents and ancestors, etc.

However, we do not have enough Bondurant information to complete the family group sheet. Do you have data on any of the Bondurants listed above.

I would be happy to pay for photocopies of any records pertaining to the individuals listed and would be glad to share the Bondurant and/or Williams information in my files.



From Linda D. Willis, 15914 Stillwood #2078, Dallas, TX 75248, 214/233-7307:

I have found marriage bonds of Caleb Bondurant to Lucy Elkin/Elkins, 8 Feb. 1q803, and of Edward Bondurant to Nancy Martin, 9 Jan. 1798, both records in Clark Co., KY. Caleb and Edward are thought to have been brothers, based upon their living near each other in KY, and, again, after they both moved to MO about 1830.

However the father of Caleb and Edward is not known, although it is thought he was either John, Joseph, or Edward Bondurant, Sr., son of John or Joseph Bondurant.

The Clerk of Buckingham Co., VA, responded that there was not a will or probate record of either John or Joseph Bondurant. I would appreciate correspondence from researchers who are working on as yet unconnected Bondurants in KY. [EDITOR'S NOTE: Buckingham Co. has lost practically all their early records to 1869 because of a court house fire.]

From BATH CO., KY, WILLS, by Annie Walker Burns, 1936.

Joseph Bondurant, will signed 7-6-1842, proved 8-14-1843. Survived by wife Rhoda.

From Mrs. Julia G. Switlick, found in EARLY TENNESSEE NEWSPAPERS 1794-1851 Married. Graves Pennington, Esq. and Martha M. Bondurant 6-7-1820, Davidson Co., TN. Deaths. Martha Pennington, infant daughter of Mr. Graves Pennington, died in this county yesterday. NATIONAL BANNER, Saturday 8-22-1829.

Mrs. Martha M. Pennington, in the 49th year of her age. Died in Davidson County on the 15th April, 1839, the consort of Mr. Graves Pennington. NASHVILLE UNION 4-26-1839.

Mrs. Pennington, wife of Graves Pennington, Esq., died in this vicinity on Monday last. NASHVILLE WHIG, Fri. 4-19-1839.

One Graves Pennington b. 3-27-1830, died 8-4-1887 (I think he was undoubtedly the son of Martha Bondurant and Graves Pennington, Esq.) married Amanda V. Terry born 7-17-1836, died Jan. 8, 1891. I was researching a son of my ggf William McGehee whose name was Benjamin Franklin McGehee. B.F. married Amanda Pennington born 8-14-1823, d. 9-15-1867 (I believe she was a sister of Graves Pennington, Jr.)

B.F. had a sister Amanda Terry whose daughter was Amanda V. Terry. I think B.F.'s niece married his wife's brother, don't you.

The three of them ( Amanda Pennington McGehee, Amanda V. Terry Pennington, and Graves Pennington are buried in a single plot with a single, 3-sided headstone in Cemetery #73-2, Franklin Co. Cemetery, Winchester City, TN. The dates of births and deaths were taken from that headstone.

In my research, I have found no children listed for B.F. and Amanda on any of the censuses, but in a letter from B.F. McGehee to his father William, he mentioned that George and Washington sent their love. He also said that George was the finest man in Tennessee.

Mr. William Al Bundrant, 1400 Cantlelight Dr. #179, Eugene, OR 97402-1438 wrote:  
The last publication of THE BONDURANT FAMILY ASSOCIATION dealt almost entirely with my family. John Bundrant and Lucy Gilley were my gggparents. The lineage followed right down the line to Hardin Alexander Bondurant and Nancy Jane Hancock who were my ggpapents, and to H.P.N. Bundrant and Jennie Evaline Cooksey who were my grandparents, to Joel Robert Bundrant and Cearie Mae Woulard who were my parents. I had all this information plus much more but it was nice to see it in a publication just the same. That lady (Mrs. Aldean Eakin) did a lot of research.

I'm sure you'll receive some response from your plea for help with the identity of "Polina" (Bondurant) Edwards, who lived in Dresden, Weakley Co., TN. She was Pauline Branford Bondurant, a daughter of Benjamin Bondurant and Sarah East Moseley, born 10 Nov. 1809 VA, died 3 July 1883, who married 1st 23 June 1826 Almus V. Force, and 2nd Thomas E. Edwards, born 22 March ;1800, died 4 April 1872. they are buried in the Edwards Cemetery in Dresden. As you know Benjamin was the son of Darby Bondurant and Ruth Agee.  
David Bondurant [writing on his trip to Genolhac] mentioned "chef Camisard Jounay" in Genolhac. Have you seen the article in THE VIRGINIA GENEALOGIST, vol. 7, #4, Oct.-Dec.-1963, pp. 147-57, entitled: "Jean Jouany as American as John Jones?"  
I have a copy of it as William Lansdon and Esther Jounay's daughter Elizabeth Lansdon was the second wife of Sylvanus Maxey.
